Stewardship Newsletter Article for JULY 2016 "Is Your Eye Healthy?"

In our Lord's parable of the vineyard workers, the vineyard owner says to those who worked the longest, "Or do you begrudge my generosity" (Matthew 20:15)? It's an unfortunate translation. It's not wrong, but it doesn't give us the full picture. What the vineyard owner actually says is this: "Or is your eye evil because I am good?" Earlier in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus said, "The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness" (Matthew 6:21–23).

This statement comes right in the middle of our Lord's teaching about giving. He said, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness! No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money' (Matthew 6:19–24).

Having an evil eye does not let in the light. Having an evil eye means that we are so focused on what we don't have, that we are unable to rejoice in what God has given. An evil eye makes us distressed when we see others prosper. It makes us rejoice when others suffer. An evil eye makes us so love ourselves and our money, that we don't want to share with others; we don't want to give of what we have because we are so focused on keeping what we have and getting what we don't.

Whereas a good eye is an eye that lets the light in so that our lives are filled with it. This light shines upon all that we have and reveals that it comes from our Father's divine goodness and mercy. A good eye that lets in the light, unencumbered by the darkness, so that we have a good will, a benevolent disposition, and a genuine happiness to see others prosper and the desire to be part of it.

Jesus came to give you a good eye and to take away the darkness that fills your life. Christ our Lord, through His death and resurrection, has forgiven your sin, removed your evil eye and given you new eyes that let in His light and truth. "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

The reality is that you have all that you need and more. You have the love of God in Christ Jesus. You have the forgiveness of sins and life everlasting. You have house and home, all that you need for this body and life. So, lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy. And you will see that your hearts will follow, just as Jesus promised.



You Can Help the Needy in Our Community!

There are a variety of ways you can help the needy in our community and in our congregation...

The Good Samaritan Fund - this fund helps members of First Lutheran Church who find themselves in need of financial aid. For an application and explanation of requirements, please see the church office manager. All requests for help will go before a small committee for approval. All requests for help will be kept confidential. *To donate to this fund, please mark "Good Samaritan Fund" on your envelope and the dollar amount you wish to contribute.*

The Esther Fund - this fund is used by First Lutheran to help provide housing for the homeless in our community. *To donate to this fund, please mark your envelope "Esther Fund" and the dollar amount you wish to contribute.*

Helping Hands of Charlotte, MI - located at 600 S. Cochran Avenue, Charlotte, Helping Hands Food Pantry helps the needy in our community with emergency food and supplies. First Lutheran collects food and supplies for Helping Hands on an on-going basis. Food donations should be of a non-perishable nature and must be in-date and unopened. *You may drop off donations to the Helping Hands tote located in the First Lutheran Church lobby or coat room, OR you may drop donations off to helping hands directly. Helping Hands also accepts monetary donations and can turn each dollar donated into three dollars worth of food. Please mail donations directly to Helping Hands at 600 S. Cochran Ave., Charlotte, MI 48813.*

SIREN/Eaton Shelter - SIREN, our only local shelter, primarily helps homeless families with children, and victims of domestic violence, by providing them with temporary housing. There is a waiting list for SIREN Shelter. SIREN Shelter has an on-going need for financial assistance as well as donations of non-perishable food items, blankets (can be used but must be clean and in good condition), pillows (must be new), infant supplies (diapers, formula, baby food), cleaning supplies, toiletries, paper products, etc. *SIREN Shelter is located at 520 Robinson St.*, *Charlotte, MI. You may drop donations off directly to the shelter at that location, or you may mail financial contributions to that address*.

A New Beginning Pregnancy Center - this Christian center located in Charlotte encourages women to seek an alternative to abortion by providing them with counseling and help. Donations of new-born sized diapers, sleepers, and Onezies are needed as well as in-date baby formula. *A donation box for these items is located in the First Lutheran lobby or coat room.*

Crosswalk Teen Center - Crosswalk Teen Center is an after-school program in downtown Charlotte that allows teens to participate in activities that focus on educational, everyday life, community connections, and expressive art to support and encourage teens between school and home. "We are a MISSION Driven Church!" Matthew 28:19-20

Are you a mission driven person?

Below I have come up with an acronym for MISSION. It is my hope that we will focus our attention as a church on the mission of the Lord. It is not a mission that we have designed or created, but one that the Lord has given us in Matthew 28:19-20, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." The Great Commission reminds us of our calling as God's people. Everything we do as a church has to be focused on this. This is why the Bible really makes it clear that we are a MISSION driven church. The following will help explain the mission of the church better:

M: Mission—The mission of the church is to make disciples of all nations by baptizing them and teaching them everything God has commanded (Matthew 28:19-20; Acts 1:8). The church is not a social club for the in-crowd, but a place where the mission of the church is always actively being done by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 1:16).

I: Intentional—We actively pursue this mission to bring the lost into our congregation. Jesus says, "Go..." St. Peter writes, "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect..." (1 Peter 3:15b). We need to go out of our way to make sure that HIS mission is part of everything we do.

S: Showing—We look at ways that we can show people Jesus in our lives. Jesus says, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

S: Savior—We have to make sure that what we are doing clearly reflects Jesus to the world (John 3:16). St. Paul wrote, "For I determined not to know anything among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified" (1 Corinthians 2:2).

I: Into—Literally, we have been baptized into Christ. "...don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?" (Romans 6:3). Jesus says, "I am with you always" (Matthew 28:20). Just as the Lord went with the children of Israel in the Old Testament in a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night, so the Lord goes with us through His Word and Sacraments. For this reason we are one body in Christ, as St. Paul says, "Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it" (1 Corinthians 12:27).

O: Outside—Jesus tells us to make disciples of "all nations". This includes people that are living outside of our church. We encourage and build one another up inside the church with the Good News of the Gospel, so that we can go outside the church and bring more people to our church to hear the saving message of the Gospel. We also send monies to missionaries overseas so that the gospel may be heard where we cannot go on our own.

N: Neighbors—You might be wondering who your neighbor is. Jesus clearly tells us in the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37) that our neighbor is anyone who has a need. This means that everyone around you is your neighbor, not just the members of your church or your family or your friends. Jesus' definition of neighbor really includes everyone.

This is the MISSION that God has given us as a church. God grant us a willingness to share the precious message of the Gospel with the world. God goes with us so that our neighbors will hear the saving news of God's love in Jesus Christ. As Jesus said to his disciples and to us, "...you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8).

What We Believe

Scripture Alone

We believe that the Holy Scriptures in their entirety are the inspired and infallible Word of God and that they alone are the only source and norm of faith and life for the Christian. We believe that the Bible is complete and requires no additions from any other source and that it clearly reveals God's plan of salvation for mankind.

Faith Alone

We believe that man was originally created holy by God but later rebelled against God and is now, by his nature, spiritually dead and blind. Only when man is brought to faith by the Holy Spirit working through the Word of God is it possible for man to be saved. Faith is God's work - not man's work - and comes only by hearing the Word of God. Man is justified before God by faith alone and not by good deeds.

Grace Alone

We believe that we are saved by grace alone and that man cannot earn his way into God's favor. Grace is the undeserved love of God who sent His Son Jesus into the world to take our place under God's law and to suffer and die to pay the penalty for our sins. Whoever trusts in that redemptive act of Jesus Christ will not perish but have everlasting life.
